The Seven Pillars of Sustainable Kingdom Communities

These experiences felt right, and made a deep impression on my young life.

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As I grew older, I became much more aware of what it took behind the scenes to make a community work, and more importantly, the difference between just any community and Kingdom Communities.

The story of God's people since creation took on a new meaning as I read through the Old and New Testament and saw the metanarrative of God's work with his

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
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lars of Sustainable Kingdom Communities: Families. Individuals, Sus-

Business Development in Indonesia

Editor's note: Indonesia is the largest archipelago in the world, consisting of five major islands and about 30 smaller groups. ASAL's vision of working with para-church organizations for sustainability has been a very interesting journey. With ASAL currently operating in five different Latin American countries, interest has sparked in other parts of the world as well.

Business visas seem to be a very viable path to longer term residency in most of these countries, which is the case in Indonesia. ASAL has provided coaching and business planning for the ABT translation project in Indonesia. Often resources in these countries are available for development—a golden opportunity for sustainable projects. The government officials graciously leased a large piece of unused property (including housing) for this project. (Additional information is available in the ABT newsletter.) Obviously, business development provides jobs. However, the more important aspect of business development is the everyday contact and interaction it provides with workers, providers, buyers, and local customers. These often lead to conversational topics of everyday life and lifetime friendships.



Hello friends! We've been living on the ranch for two months and are getting used to the new rhythm of life. We have seven employees. They come to work 6 days a week and take off on Sundays, since that's normal here. These men really want to work! They have been a real blessing to us. They have put in many hours already, clearing lanes through the tangle and putting up electric fence. Our first two employees are Agil and Gani, the sons of our friend Ilham. Agil can fix most things from cell phones to chainsaws. Or he can build cabinets and install electric wiring. Gani likes to plant things-coconut trees and different grass varieties.

Next is Aal. He is just 22 years old. He has a wife and baby girl. Aal likes to work in the woods. He is collecting lumber from the land we are clearing so he can build a house.

Our oldest employee, Sugiari, is a migrant worker from Java. He is in his forties and is quiet and steady.

Bari is just a young fellow in his low twenties. He's strong and hard-working.



Places like Indonesia have a tremendous need for good businesses. People like me have a calling to live in Indonesia so we can live out the Gospel. ASAL helps us plan and run a good business. Now we are able to live here and channel blessings into our community. Running a cattle ranch is fun and fulfilling. It provides endless opportunities to interact with people and demonstrate the way of Jesus.



THE EARTH IS THE LORD'S

The earth is the LORD's, and the fulness thereof; the world, and they that dwell therein. Ps.24:1



Plant life can utilize the four basic items mentioned above: minerals, water, sunshine, and correct temperature. Plants are the part of God's creation that can produce the food they need as well as extra for the consumption of animals and people. While plants do not have emotional characteristics, they do reproduce.

Animals' food source is the consumption of plants and other animals. Animals do have emotional characteristics and reproduce. However, they do not have free choice, as man rules over them.

Humans' food source is the consumption of plants and animals. Humans rule with free choice, have emotional characteristics, and reproduce.

Now let's explore the fullness part. Suppose a person buys a piece of property—ten acres of woodland. Now he owns a resource that God created. As long as he lives and is owner of that property, here are the resources/fullness he receives every day:

- a. He receives 24 free hours per day and might trade 8 hours per day for a wage.
- b. He might use a few free hours per day to cut down some trees and make use of the wood.
- c. With free time, he may plant the cleared land with some seeds of grain and fruit trees.
- d. He could feed animals with the grain to produce meat and other food products.
- e. Plants and animals are growing on free time—he can care for them on free time.
- f. With the property purchase came free sunshine, free rain water, and free temperatures.
- g. A family can provide lots of free or very low cost labor.

When we analyze all of the free items that we are blessed with every day, we begin to appreciate the fullness God has packed into His creation. On any given day, a variety of trees, fruits, vegetables, and animals can simultaneously be producing. A healthy financial principle is to invest the money earned before spending it. Even the basic concept of a savings account—earning interest on your money—is better than just spending your earnings right up front. You worked for the wage; now have the wage work for you! Before you spend the wage you earned, invest as much of it as you can. Invest in something that will continue to produce over and over, from the free resources God has packed into the fullness of His creation.

BUSINESS NUGGETS—Predicting Cash Flow

This might sound like an unnecessary question, but it is much more important than most business owners realize.

In a previous newsletter, I wrote an article answering the question, "When should I apply for a loan?" In short, the answer was, "Before you need it." But how can I know I need it before I need it?

The answer is budgeting. Budgeting is a critical part of running a business.

When I started my first business 32 years ago, I knew little to nothing about budgeting. But I soon learned the need for it the hard way. It took me years to understand the discipline of budgeting and to perfect the process and skill of creating a good budget.

This Business Nugget is not a deep dive on budgeting. Rather I presume you have at least a basic level of understanding on budgeting, or you are willing to ask for help from someone who does. I was not alone 32 years ago-most of my colleagues and mentors did not understand budgeting

either. Today that has changed drastically among most conservative Anabaptist groups, thanks to a significant amount of teaching by organizations such as Anabaptist Financial, SALT, and Open Hands, just to name a few.

We have also engaged in increasingly more complex businesses that have forced us to learn the disciplines of budgeting, among many other business skills.

> The two main reasons a business would need to borrow money is for buying more assets or increasing operating cash.

The answer to the question in this article lies in creating a 3 year budget on the Income and Expense, Balance Sheet and Cash Flow Statement by the month. This will clearly show you where your cash needs are, and whether you need to borrow money to carry you through this time or if you need to change something in your operation or plans to avoid the negative cash flow.

Learn the skill of predicting Cash Flow-it will change your life!



COUNTRY Highlights



- **2. Population:** 17,703,190 people. Guatemala is the most populous country in Central America. Pennsylvania, by comparison, has 13,062,764 people. About 56% of Guatemala's population are Mestizo (Indian-European mixed descent) and about 42% are of Mayan descent.
- **3. The capital city** is Guatemala City—home to some 3,036,000 people.
- **4. Religion:** Catholicism is not as prevalent today as it was in the past. About 42% of the people are Catholic and about 39% Evangelical. There are still those who follow traditional Mayan religious practices.
- 5. Foreign income: The single largest source of foreign income is from Guatemalans living in the US and sending money back to their families. Rough estimates put this amount in the 10-15 billion dollar range annually.
- **6. Economy:** Tourism is one of the main drivers of the economy. Coffee, sugar, and bananas are the main exports.










